The Spirit of Dorcas: Serving in Love

HONOURING THE PAST, EMBRACING THE CALL

In Acts 9:36–43, we meet a remarkable woman named Dorcas (also known as Tabitha in Aramaic). The Scriptures describe her as a disciple, a rare and meaningful designation; she is the only woman explicitly called a disciple in the New Testament. This tells us that her life wasn't just marked by good deeds, but by a deep, personal commitment to Christ.

Dorcas was known for being "full of good works and acts of charity". She sewed garments for widows — a group especially vulnerable in biblical times — and cared for the poor with compassion and dignity. Her service wasn't loud or celebrated, but when she died, her absence was so deeply felt that the community cried out to God. The widows literally held up the clothes she had made as a testimony of her love - and in a beautiful act of grace, God used Peter to raise her from the dead, not for her own sake alone, but because her life was too vital to the mission of mercy to be over.

This story reminds us that God honours the quiet work of compassionate hands. The Kingdom of God is not built only by preachers and prophets, but also by seamstresses, caregivers, cooks, and companions, those who embody faith through action, whose ministries are woven into daily life.

Dorcas reflects the very heart of Jesus, who said in Matthew 25, "I was hungry and you gave me something to eat... I was a stranger and you invited me in... Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me."

This is the spirit that continues to live on in AFM Welfare, in every Child and Youth Care Centre, every Old Age Home, every feeding scheme, prayer visit, and care parcel delivered by a local assembly. It's in the hands of volunteers, caregivers, social workers, pastors, and donors who give their time, skills, and resources to uplift the most vulnerable among us.

As we look toward the revival of the **Welfare Congress in 2026**, we remember the Dorcas Congresses of the past, gatherings filled with power, compassion, and purpose. But this next chapter will go deeper. The world has changed. The needs have grown. But the call remains the same: to serve in love, just as Dorcas did.

This resuscitation is not just an event, it is a spiritual awakening. It's a call to embody the Gospel through compassionate action. To remind ourselves that serving others is not optional, it is central to who we are as followers of Christ. Let us, like Dorcas, hear the cry of the poor and the lonely. Let us be the hands of Jesus in a world that is hurting. Let us build a legacy that heaven remembers - a life poured out in love.

As AFM Welfare, we stand with churches across the country during **National Child Protection Week** (this year celebrated from 29 May – 5 June) – a vital campaign that reminds us of our shared duty to protect the most vulnerable in our communities: our children.

This year's theme, "Every Conversation Matters," powerfully reminds us that our words and actions - especially around children can shape their sense of trust, safety, and belonging. Closely linked is the message: "Caring Communities Protect Children" – a call that resonates deeply with the Church's mission.



The Church plays a critical role in this work:

- Share child protection messages in sermons and lessons.
- Make your church a safe space where children are seen, heard, and respected.
- Support Child and Youth Care Centres and volunteers.
- Collaborate with local schools, clinics, and leaders to strengthen child safety networks.
- And above all, pray and act, because faith without action is incomplete.

Key issues that require our voice and vigilance:

- Reporting abuse and neglect.
- Discouraging child abandonment by referring to social workers for support.
- Promoting online safety and mental health awareness.
- Speaking against sexual exploitation, teenage pregnancy, drug abuse, and suicide.
- Reinforcing the child's right to parental care and nurturing families to thrive.

At 86 years old, Mr. John Fortuin has made a remarkable impact since becoming a resident at **Sarepta Old Age Home** in 2024. Despite facing health challenges, John embodies the spirit of active aging. His passion for gardening has not only enhanced the facility's grounds but also influenced fellow residents.

John was born in Elsie's River and spent much of his life there. He was married for 51 years before the sad passing of his wife two years ago. Together, they had two sons, one of whom tragically passed away in 2010. His surviving son lives in New Zealand, and John is a proud grandfather to two grandsons. For 24 years, John worked as a salesman for Coca-Cola.

Journey to Sarepta

After his wife's passing, John lived with his niece in Elsie's River. Following some health challenges, he decided to apply for residency at Sarepta Old Age Home, where he has since found a new sense of purpose.



Although John has only been a resident for a relatively short time, he has already become an integral part of life at Sarepta. His positive attitude, kind spirit, and dedication to his passions have made him a beloved figure among both residents and staff. Despite some health concerns, John is still able to devote his time to his love of gardening. He was moved to a room that offers easy access to a courtyard where he tends to his plants, creating a serene space for both himself and others to enjoy. Since John's arrival, the gardens at Sarepta have flourished. His dedication made a significant impact on the facility's appearance, ensuring that it remains a welcoming and beautiful environment for everyone.

Daily Life:

Each day, John starts his morning early with his devotions before taking a walk through the gardens. After breakfast, he spends hours caring for his plants and beautifying the garden—watering, pruning, and replanting flowers throughout the grounds. He enjoys sharing plants with fellow residents, gifting them as tokens of kindness. Though quiet, John is well-respected and admired by his peers and the staff, who appreciate his calm and compassionate presence. John still owns a vehicle and drives to his local church twice a week for services.

Wisdom and Guidance:

John lives by the simple motto, "Do what your hands find to do." He leads by example, showing kindness through his actions rather than words. His life at Sarepta is a testament to the power of positive living, regardless of age or health. His strong faith as a devoted follower of Christ further inspires those around him, setting an example of love and devotion.
